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I. Successes from the MITW 2007 Strategic Plan.

Originally, the 2007 Strategic Plan's Social Workgroup created three goals and twelve objectives. The workgroup involved members of the community, partners, and stakeholders to address the necessary changes needed to improve the quality of life for individuals. With that in mind, Social Service employees participated on various committees within the Tribe and with outside communities. They have created long-lasting collaborative relationships over the past 16 years to provide services in the following areas:

- Menominee Tribal Housing
- **Community Engagement Workshops**
- Safe Schools and Healthy Students (MISD)
- Children's Code Committee
- Coordinated Community Response Team
- Multidisciplinary Team (Federal)
- Child Protection Team
- Tribal Justice Strategic Planning Committee
- Intertribal Child Welfare Committee (State)
- Intertribal Training Partnership Committee (State)
- **Coordinated Services Team Advisory Committee**
- Tribal/County Planning Committee
- Zero Suicide Planning Committee
- **Youth Development and Outreach**
- Fostering Futures (Trauma Informed Care); The State grant ended in 2019 but the work continues now, meeting as "Kapaemehtonenaw".
- Northwood's Coalition

Participation in these committees results in the collaboration of services, sharing in policy development, and advocating for Menominee families. The goals and objectives created back in 2007 were revisited and are ongoing through collaboration and relationship building to support, strengthen, and encourage families through the assumption of all human service programs for Menominee County and Reservation; moving forward with the strategic plan through inclusion of the 2023 goals and objectives that were newly formed.

II. Community Survey Overview

The Community Survey asked respondents a total of eleven questions regarding their perceptions of housing, youth, and elder programs, the overall quality of life, and the coordination of service delivery. The survey results revealed the following notable highlights:

- 60% of on-reservation and 39% of off-reservation respondents indicated that more programs for the elderly are needed on the reservation.
- One-fourth of respondents on and off the reservation indicated the quality of the Tribe's efforts to support family life is good; 34/21% rated the quality of life as not-so-good.
- Regarding programs for youth on the reservation, 65% of on-reservation and 52% of off-reservation respondents feel more programs are needed. 67% on and 66% off-reservation feel the Menominee Tribal Legislature should take an active role in developing youth programs.

75% of on-reservation and 60% of off-reservation respondents feel more housing is needed for elders on the reservation.

- 96% of on-reservation and 93% of off-reservation feel alcohol and drug abuse is a very important problem on the Menominee Reservation today. 94/82% believe the problem has increased over the past 10 years.
 - Key factors that impact alcohol and drug abuse, according to survey respondents, include boredom, grief, and poverty, as well as a lack of self-awareness, identity, and sense of belonging.
 - Intergenerational trauma, inadequate family structure, lack of resources, and joblessness were also named as key factors that impact substance use disorders. Respondents indicated that the new drugs are the most dangerous to community members; they are more potent, more available, and more addictive.
- Survey respondents indicated they would like to see increased access to housing for young adults, elders, and single Tribal members.

III. Planning Workgroup

A workgroup comprised of professionals and community members was assembled to evaluate the community survey comparative data to identify and address problems and their underlying causes. The workgroup identified programs that directly address youth and elders, and designed strategies aimed at enhancing the Tribe's efforts to increase the overall quality of life on the reservation. The workgroup consisted of the following departments:

Administration

Community Resource Center

Menīkānaehkem

Aging and Long-Term Care

S Education

Tribal School

S Communications

Housing

Youth Services

The workgroup met weekly throughout a two-month period in early 2023. Information about the workgroup's efforts to develop goals and objectives for the social visionary area was posted on the website, and the Menominee App, and made available at retreats, community meetings, and through the Menominee Nation Newspaper.

IV. Programs with a Specific Emphasis on Social

Although the workgroup recognized that all departments and programs operated by the Tribe have a vested interest in the promotion of wellness and enhanced quality of life on the reservation, the workgroup identified the following Tribal programs as resources due to their emphasis on youth, elder, and family programming:

- **Tribal Social Services:** This department is responsible for developing and overseeing a vast array of programs and services aimed at protecting the interests of children and families, identifying safe out-of-home care placements for children and families, identifying safe out-of-home care placements for children in adoptions that are subject to the Indian Child Welfare Act, and implementing and enforcing the Tribe's child support laws.
- Aging: This department is responsible for developing and overseeing a vast array of programs and services aimed at caring for and protecting the rights of and providing nutritious meal services to the elderly.
- Youth Development and Outreach: This department is responsible for developing and overseeing a vast array of programs and services aimed at providing youth with challenging educational and recreational activities and opportunities designed to inspire them, identify alternatives to harmful behavior, and cultivate their leadership skills.
- Maehnowesekiyah Wellness Center: This department is responsible for developing and overseeing a vast array of programs and services aimed at curbing alcohol and other drug abuse among members of the community utilizing a cultural-based approach.
- Early Childcare Services: This department is responsible for developing and overseeing programs and services aimed at providing safe, supportive, educational, and recreational activities to young children enrolled in the Tribe's daycare and Early Head Start operations.

V. SWOT Analysis

VI. Overview of Goals and Objectives

In the Social service area, the workgroup developed five goals and twenty-six objectives. These goals include the following:

- Goal One: Create a comprehensive resource directory of services and providers.
 - Objective One: Identify existing directories of resources and services to build from.
 - Objective Two: Compile information regarding additional resources, services, and providers.
 - Objective Three: Disseminate information to the right audiences using the best platform to reach them, being inclusive of the needs of all Tribal members as possible.
 - Objective Four: Identify barriers to participation/access and create strategies to address the barriers.
 - Objective Five: Redesign the website to be more efficient and user-friendly.
 - Objective Six: Disseminate/conduct bi-annual mailings to all Tribal members on the availability of resources/services and where to find more information.
- Goal Two: Provide Access to Services that will Support the Homeless.
 - Objective One: Define homelessness, reasons for being homeless, and identify categories of need.
 - Objective Two: Assess the needs and scope of the impact.
 - Objective Three: Evaluate the process for access to housing: enhance transparency in communication and information sharing regarding housing.
 - Objective Four: Define a short-term strategy to address immediate needs, streamline the process, and provide case management support for identified individuals.
 - Objective Five: Create a long-term strategy to address the needs of those identified.
- Goal Three: Get food to the individuals most in need and ensure it is maintained as a resource for them.
 - Objective One: Assess the number of Tribal youth who are struggling with food insecurities.
 - Objective Two: Identify existing programs that offer food for other Tribal members to build this resource out to serve Tribal youth or other underserved areas.
 - Objective Three: Create a strategy to get food to the individuals most in need and ensure it is maintained as a resource for them.
 - Objective Four: Find ways to provide food where youth and people in need are gathered and access funding to pay for the food.
 - Objective Five: Research other programs (i.e., Ruby's Pantry) to explore the possibility of bringing additional services to the area using models already created.
- Goal Four: Create a strategy to be responsive to Tribal Members struggling with mental health (suicide awareness) and access to services.
 - Objective One: Assess and build upon existing resources and services.
 - Objective Two: Identify gaps in services and talk with families about their unmet needs.
 - Objective Three: Eliminate barriers to accessing mental health services, make the process more efficient, and reduce the wait time. Where possible, bring mental health services to underserved communities.
 - Objective Four: Create a community awareness plan around suicide prevention and how to access crisis intervention services.
 - Objective Five: In cooperation with the Health Pillar, enhance and create programs to support sober living efforts and address AODA concerns, especially as they impact mental health and suicide rates.
- Goal Five: Increase Housing Opportunities.
 - Objective One: Perform GAP Analysis.
 - Objective Two: Identify more housing locations.
 - Objective Three: Continue to address housing/tenant policy.
 - Objective Four: Utilize community service programs for recreation and residential improvement.
 - Objective Five: Incorporate community policing and crime prevention approaches into housing.
